
NAWCA Annual Show & Competition 2016



SPENDING A WEEK AT THE AUSTRIAN CARVING SCHOOL GEISLER-MORODER IN THE TYROL ALPS



I have been thinking of taking a course at this school for many years. Finally, this year I combined it with a visit to my relatives in Austria. The school is located in Elbigenalp, a small mountain village high up in the Alps in the Austrian province of Tyrol. The closest large city is Munich from where it is fairly easy to get to Elbigenalp by train and bus.



The Geisler-Moroder carving school offers 1-week (full day or half day) courses in all carving disciplines from chip and relief carving, to carving religious figures, animals, sculpting, and chainsaw carving. The school compound includes a Guesthouse/Pension with full room and board, a very cozy restaurant, quite a few classrooms, a store which sells wood carvings, and another store selling anything a wood carver can dream of. There are shelves full of rough-outs, a large

selection of Stubai chisels, books, grinders for sharpening, and other power tools like chainsaws. I was interested in purchasing a few items, like the CBM sharpening wheel that weighed about 3 pounds. In the end I decided not to buy anything as I was at the maximum weight already with my luggage when I flew from Edmonton to Munich.







I had signed up for the course "carving animals" in the round. After arriving and checking into the pension, we had an introductory session with the instructor on Sunday evening. The class started on Monday morning. The classroom had carving tables/stands for 10 students, shelves with all the carving tools needed and a tool sharpening station.







The students in my class came from the U.S., Holland, Switzerland, Ireland, Austria and Germany. All of them had some previous experience in wood carving. Some of them had attended classes at this carving school before. Our instructor was a young master carver who had studied at the same school.

I chose to carve a North American Wolf. The first step was to search for wolf pictures in the school's extensive library containing hundreds of books about carving. I made a few sketches and drawings of how I wanted the wolf to look. Next step was to produce a plasticine model of the wolf in the exact size and pose I wanted it to be. Once the model looked to me (and the instructor) it had the right proportions and appearance the carving instructor took the measurements and had a block of linden wood cut at the woodworking shop next door.







Linden wood is similar to bass wood, only a little bit denser and with more grain. After transferring the outlines of the wolf onto the wood, a rough cut out was made on the band saw. Then the work with chisels and mallet began. The school teaches the traditional European wood carving with chisel and mallet. No knives and no power tools are used except for the band saw.







Soon the class room became a lively place, everybody chipping away at their carving projects, getting advice from the instructor and every so often touching up the chisels at the sharpening station. The time went by fast every day. We had a coffee break in the morning, lunch at noon and another coffee break with delicious cakes in the afternoon which was my favorite. There was lots of time for socializing, exchanging information with other carvers, talking to the instructors and teachers and visiting other class rooms and the store. Every day there were very interesting, hour-long lectures about carving subjects such as drawing, tool sharpening, modelling, carving the human figure, letter carving and other carving related topics which every student could attend if it was of interest to her or him. I attended at least one of these lectures every day.

The week went by fast. I did not quite complete my carving but that was not important to me as my main objective for attending the school was to learn about the carving process and carving techniques and anything related to carving an animal in the round.

After receiving our attendance certificates and having a final lunch on Saturday at noon everybody packed up, shook hands and headed back home.
